



Texas Landscape: Demographic and Socio-economic

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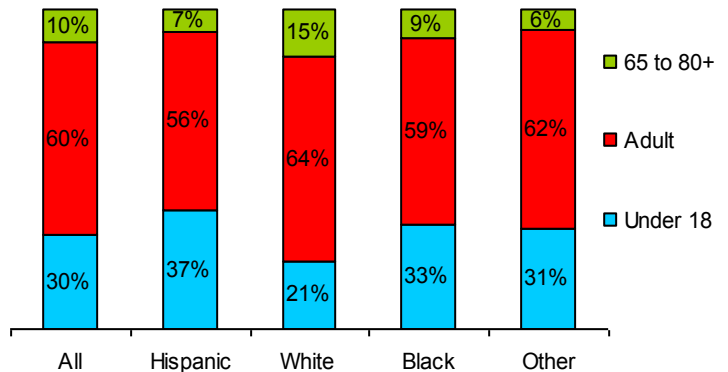
TX Population: 24,194,325

White ~ 43% Hispanic ~ 41% Black ~ 11% Other ~ 5%

In 2005, Texas was propelled into “Minority Majority” status by significant growth among Hispanics and other racial groups.

Of the 24.1 million Texans, 41% are Hispanic. Between 1990-2000, Hispanics accounted for 60.27% of the net population change in Texas. Hispanics are projected to represent over 53% in 2040 of the Texas population compared to 32% and 10% for Anglos and Blacks

Key Demographics and Socio-Economic Findings:

- ◆ Approximately 2 of 5 Texans are of workforce age.
 - ◇ Adults 19-44 yrs old account for 37% of the TX population.
 - ◇ Children 6-12 yrs old make-up 10% of the TX population; 50% of this age group is Hispanic.
 - ◇ Children 1-5 yrs account for 10% of the TX population; 56% of these children are Hispanic.
 - ◇ The Median age of Hispanics, 27, is lower than TX’s median age, 33.2

- ◆ Educational Attainment in TX is the lowest among Hispanics.
 - ◇ Hispanics over the age of 17 are more likely to have less than a *high school diploma or equivalent*, 39%, compared to their black (12%) and White (9%) counterparts.
 - ◇ Whites over the age of 25 are more likely to have obtained a higher education degree than their Black and Hispanic counterparts. About 27%, 14%, and 9%, respectively, have a Bachelor’s degree or higher.

- ◆ About 60% of Hispanic and Black households will make less than the state’s household median income.

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At the end of 2006, in the United States, the gap between The unemployment rates of Hispanics (4.9%) and non-Hispanics (4.4%) hit an all time low of 0.5%. During the first quarter of 2008, the unemployment rate for Hispanics in the U.S. increased more starkly, to 6.5%, compared to non-Hispanics, 4.7%. Loss of construction jobs is thought to be a major cause of employment dropped. (Pew Hispanic Center, Latino Labor Report 2008)

- ◇ In 2008, Hispanics were 37% of the TX labor force (Whites~48% and Blacks~11%).

- ◇ Hispanics and Blacks are almost twice as likely than Whites to be working in low earning jobs (service occupations).
- ◇ The larger the family the more likely they are not making a living wage.

White ~ 7% Hispanics ~ 25% Black ~ 20%

- ◇ Hispanics and Blacks are more likely than their White counterparts to be living in poverty.
- ◇ Hispanic females who are head of household with children under 18 have a 1 in 2 chance of living in poverty.
- ◇ One in four Hispanics live below the FPL.
- ◇ 35% of Whites live at 500% and above FPL, that is about three times more than Hispanics (9%).
